The alpha acids were up for most hop farmers this year due to the warmer then normal spring. The bad news about this years hop crop is that due to a June hailstorm, part of some hop farmers crop was wiped out. In the Puterbaugh's case, they lost some of the aroma varieties and they say that area wide aroma varieties were scarce and you may notice a price increase in some of these varieties.

If you have not yet visited the Yakima Valley during the hop harvest, you are missing out on a rewarding experience.

Would An Ox By Any Other Name Be As Blue?

During our last visit to Scot's dad in Fort Bragg, California, we were lucky enough to be there for Paul Bunyan days. During Labor Day weekend the town goes all out celebrating Paul Bunyan and Babe, his big blue ox. The weekend includes many events, but the one that caught our attention was the Blue Ox Beer Festival held from noon to 4 on Saturday. We put our daughter down for a nap and left granddad in charge then headed over to the Senior Center (this event was a fund raiser for the center).

At this point you may be laughing, but there was a very respectable showing of northern California microbreweries. Thirteen breweries were in attendance (see table below) many I'm sure you will recognize. Admission was \$15, which included a very nice, heavy-bottomed sampling glass and all you could drink. Most breweries had more than one of their beers available to sample. About a quarter of the breweries had bottles on ice; the rest had kegs with jockey boxes. Most beers were the "lighter" summer beers. I only remember one or two porters.

We sampled quite a bit in the hour and a half or so that we were there. Most often we asked for just a quarter to a third of a sample glass so as to be responsible tasters, but when we found one we liked we would go back for seconds (or thirds). We both tried Humboldt's Hemp Ale. Our consensus was that it might make great rope (among other things), but we didn't enjoy this particular beer.

However, I was very fond of Lost Coast's Great White, a Belgian wit, of course. I found myself going back often to have more of this very clean and refreshing beverage. Outside the temperature was in the upper 70's and with poor cross-ventilation and numerous bodies, all combined with brew and music, the two tasting rooms were getting very warm. Did I mention the music...there was a Cajun trio, complete with washboard, entertaining the crowd. It got quite lively at times.

Scot liked the Great White and also gave it the Best of Festival endorsement. After visiting many tables and surfacing for cooler air, he got stuck in an amber rut and I found him back at Lost Coast enjoying some large samples of the Alley Cat Amber. He also thoroughly enjoyed Mount St. Helena's Palisades Pale Ale.

So, if you ever find yourself in northern California on Labor Day weekend we strongly suggest you check out this small though extraordinary beer festival. It is well worth the effort.
